


BIRMINGHAM

THE UK'S SECOND CITY >

- •The 2nd most populated city in the UK and the most populated English local government district
- Birmingham is a metropolitan borough of the West
 Midlands, with its size and significance making it the heart of the Midlands
 - •Central location in England makes Birmingham an ideal location for logistics:
 - •Motorways (M5, M6, M40)
 - •Rail (Birmingham New Street, HS2 2030)
 - Air Travel (Birmingham Airport)
 - •Only 127 miles away from London (a two-hour train journey)





BIRMINGHAM

A History of Industry

Founded in the 7th Century & in 1166 gained a trading charter; the town's central location made it ideal for trading

By 1700 it was the 5th largest town in England, and was a key location during the Midlands Enlightenment and Industrial Revolution

Grew to prominence as a centre of manufacturing and engineering over 250 years (1700 – 1950)

The town was devastated by heavy bombing during WW2 in the 'Birmingham Blitz' as it was a centre of manufacturing

Remodeled in 50s & 60s including construction of the iconic Bullring Shopping Centre

Collapse of manufacturing forced the city to change to a service economy inc. 3rd largest financial centre in England








POPULATION & PROPERTY OWNERSHIP

- •1.1 million population within Birmingham city area.
 - •3.9% growth to 1.186M by 2028
 - •7.8% growth to 1.23M by 2038
- •Includes 80,000 students from eight universities
- •Young population 60% 16 74 vs 67% UK average for this age bracket
 - •Culturally diverse: 27% Asian population. 4.5% Mixed race.
- •Only 26% (2011 census) own their own property. Massively below UK average of 63% (2016) Very strong demand for rental property.
 - •2.9 million within the greater Birmingham Urban area
 - •5.9 million in the West Midlands Combined Area (WMCA)





BIRMINGHAM ECONOMY

- •Birmingham had the fastest growing economy outside of the South East and East of England during the second quarter of 2019
- •Dominated by the service sector & retails/events/conference sectors
- •88% of workforce work in the service sector (44,000 businesses, 98% private)
- •Non Service employers include:

- •Royal Bank of Scotland/RBS

- •Sainsburys
- Jaguar

HS2



A FUTURE OF CONNECTVITY>

- •The HS2 High Speed Rail project will build a new high speed railway, increasing capacity and connecting major economic centres
- •2 HS2 stations, Central & Solihull
- •HS2 Phase I (completion 2030) will connect the West Midlands and Birmingham to London, while Phase 2 (completed 2032-33) will complete the 'Y' shaped network from Birmingham to Manchester and Leeds
- •Future impact of HS2:
- •Rail travel is predicted to more than double in 20 years, and the HS2 line from Birmingham to London will reduce from 1 hour 21 minutes to 49 minutes.
- •Birmingham to Manchester will reduce from 1 hour 28 minutes to 41 minutes
- •Birmingham will be at the heart of the HS2 network, undoubtedly boosting Birmingham property prices





BIRMINGHAM SCHOOLS

- •647 Schools & FE Colleges
- •370 Primary Schools
- •167 Secondary Schools
- •110 FE/6th form Colleges
- •85 (17%) are 'Outstanding' OFSTED
- •https://www.compare-school-performance.service.gov.uk/
- •Large number of excellent independent and private schools in Birmingham make it an attractive location for families
- •Almost all Birmingham's A Level performance indicators are better than national, Core Cities, Statistical Neighbours, and West Midlands Local Authorities

•Since 2015 growth 5-10% per year


•6% for 2020, forecast due to Covid -4% but will




